Greetings,

For the season I would like you to ponder a couple of the traditional Isaiah passages that are hallmarks of our Advent observation.

The first is Isaiah 9:2-7. You know it well. It begins with the words: *The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined... For the yoke of their burden and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian...* (look it up and keep reading).

The second is Isaiah 61:1-11. You also know this one. Jesus repeated it in the synagogue at the beginning of his public ministry: *The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn... (ditto).*

For us, even while these are inspiring words and we can imagine the impact this would have for people in bondage, too often the immediacy of such words is far removed from our personal experience. When I go to Palestine and try to plant olive trees for Palestinians on their own land, getting harassed by extremist Israeli settlers or thrown off the fields by Israeli military with fierce-looking firepower in hand, in addition to other troubling experiences we have, I get a feeling for these passages. But yet again, the experience is a world away and you have to literally be there and experience these things to relate.

But we do not have to go that far away. Since Ruth became the Peace River Presbytery's Mission Coordinator for Mision Peniel (literally meaning: *The Face of God Mission*) in Immokalee, under the direction of Pastor Miguel Estrada, I have been learning a great deal about the struggles of the migrant workers. I went over and helped following Hurricane Irma, distributing goods in the trailer camps, seeing the conditions in which migrant workers exist. They are living in what I can only describe as "the crappiest trailers I have ever seen" and have to pay up to \$1500 a month (they are charged by the "head"—how many actually live in the trailer) for the privilege--the "underprivilege", if you ask me.

also people who are afraid to complain because under present immigration law, it is complicated to be a migrant worker in America. We want them to do the jobs average Americans will not take, and the farmers *need* them or they are out of business, but these migrants keep their mouths shut because stirring the pot by standing up for oneself might get you grabbed by immigration officials. Remember that when Wendy's puts a tomato on your burger or you buy tomatoes in Publix-neither business sees fit to join the fair food coalition, even after being told by the Coalition of Immokalee Workers what's at stake: Human rights.

When you tour the museum at the Coalition office across the street from Mision Peniel, you get an eyeful—you walk through a God-awful history about how migrant workers have been treated (but also the small victories won by the Coalition). You see pictures of the actual cases in which slave labor has existed in Immokalee—with migrant "slaves" shackled and living in the back of semi-tractor trailers. It has really happened as late as 2006. Hopefully it doesn't anymore, but there is no way to tell.

Friends, these are the people and conditions, and these are the struggles that Isaiah was writing about. In Advent we want to jump to Christmas so badly that we start working the message of Bethlehem and the manger in as guickly as we can. But there is an Advent we have to go through to fully understand why Christ's coming was so important and vital to the world. And, we do not have to look back on ancient history or a world away to relate. Just look down Highway 82 about 40 miles.

L.I.F.E. to Focus on Services for Families and Youth as 2018 "Ask" Issue

Covenant is a member of the L.I.F.E. (Lee Interfaith for Empowerment) justice coalition consisting of 13 Lee County church congregations working for justice within the County.

At it's Annual Assembly in October, LIFE voted to focus on Services for Families & Youth as their issue for the 2018 Nehemiah Action "ask".

LIFE will also continue to work on a previous year's "ask", the use of civil citations in lieu of arrests for misdemeanor offense, by 1) continuing to support the statewide collaborative effort on civil citations legislation and 2) working with local law enforcement agencies for broader use of civil citations.
