Greetings,

After we elect, ordain/install new leaders in the church, I think it is helpful for us to reflect on our church leadership both past and present.

At our Service of Installation and Ordination on January 8 we celebrated the new leadership of the following individuals: For Deacon, Ellen Burnette (newly ordained), Barbara Griffith (returning to complete 2nd year as Deacon Moderator), Pat McFarland (installed, served as Deacon elsewhere), and Barbara Murnane (newly ordained); For Elder, Richard Cox (installed, served as elder at Covenant twice before), Teddy Hogle (installed, served as PCUSA elder elsewhere), Nancy Marti (newly ordained), and Connie Wilhite (newly ordained). In addition to these offices, we also welcome Kent Sheets to Covenant's Board of Trustees.

At the same time, I want to personally thank, and thank with you, those who have faithfully served and are now rotating off the Board or Session: *Deacons*, Skip Laukemper, Barb Sheets and Anna Sieman; *Elders*, Emily Coyne (Young Adult Elder), Dave Garrison (Mission Chairperson), Bob Groenleer (Property Chairperson), JoAnn Leasure (Membership and Evangelism Chairperson), Jack Ruzicho (Human Relations and Nominating Chairperson).

As I think about both the service and the gifts of the incoming and outgoing elders and deacons. I am truly thankful to God for the leadership of each and every one of them: Serving on the Board of Deacons and on the Session of Covenant Presbyterian Church is a big commitment. Being chosen by the church nominating committee and elected by the congregation is no small thing in our tradition. Ordination in our church is to three separate offices, all distinct unto themselves.

Elders are charged with the responsibility of church oversight. Once ordained an elder, a person is always an elder in the PCUSA. While actively serving on the Session, they are referred to as *ruling elders*.

Deacons are charged with the responsibility of the care and nurture of the congregation. As in the case of Elders, once one is ordained a deacon, it is for life whether one is active on the board or not.

Ministers of Word and Sacrament (also referred to as teaching elders) are charged with the responsibility of preaching, teaching, pastoral care and overseeing the order and program of the church by moderating the Session and acting as church head of staff (where appropriate). A teaching elder is not to decide for a local congregation, but is to lead and dialogue with the Session about important decisions for the church and then allow the ruling elders to make the decision based on their wisdom, conscience and the leading of God's Spirit. the same way, the Pastor does not tell the Deacons how to do their work in a particular congregation, but comes alongside to advise and support. A teaching elder does not hold membership in a local congregation but is a member of the presbytery, the next highest judicatory in the Presbyterian system, which has complete oversight of all ministers.

Leadership in any of these roles in the life of the church requires the nominating committee (in the case of local congregations and elected by the congregation) and Committees on Ministry (in the case of presbytery oversight of teaching elders) to discern the leadership capability (understanding that leadership comes in different forms and styles) and commitment of those who wish to serve in this capacity. Such committees approach their work prayerfully, and with a knowledge of our ecclesiastical order and process. Those chosen are done so on the basis of individuals having clearly demonstrated leadership in the life of the congregation. We don't, for instance, nominate individuals to these offices to get someone involved in church life. Ultimately, through these processes the church elects and ordains individuals that it believes God is calling to lead in a particular time and place. This means that although we shorthand our process by calling it *representative democracy*, we also recognize that God has a hand—the most important hand—in choosing our leaders.

I realize that I have probably shared more information with you than you wanted to know. After coming through a selection process that lasted four months (from the first gathering of the nominating committee to the Service of Ordination and Installation), however, I think it is important to remember how much work, prayer and commitment is required to find our leaders and maintain the continuity of overall church leadership throughout the years.

As the transition has now been officially made as of last month, I ask that you do the following: Keep our newly ordained and installed leaders in your prayers as they begin their duties, remember and give thanks for those who have recently completed their service, and verbally encourage and thank all the leaders of our church when you have the opportunity. In that way we maintain the integrity and fellowship of our community and together look forward to another important year of serving Christ here in Fort Myers, throughout our denomination and in Christ's Church Universal.

LIFE Justice Coalition Update

Covenant is a member of the LIFE (Lee Interfaith For Empowerment) justice coalition consisting of 13 Lee County church congregations working for justice within the county in several areas of people's lives. LIFE has been a very successful justice ministry in Lee County by increasing juvenile mental health resources, introducing antibullying training public schools, increasing the use of civil citations in lieu of arrests for first time misdemeanor offenders by the County's law enforcement agencies, and banning "the box" regarding past criminal convictions on employment applications for the City of Fort Myers.

LIFE is currently working to reduce the number of unsolved murders in Fort Myers that we read about in The News-Press. Research is a key phase of successful justice actions, and several Covenant members are active in this research work. LIFE is working with the new Fort Myers Police Chief Diggs in exploring many areas including assigning additional detectives to "cold" cases, a restorative justice program collaboration between the State Attorney's Office and the FMPD. LIFE's "Big Event" is the annual **Nehemiah Action Assembly** where we present our research and recommendations for action on the current issue and "ask" the appropriate officials and decision makers to agree to the "ask". All Covenant members and friends are invited to attend and we hope a large number will come and support the Covenant LIFE Team.
