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SESSION HIGHLIGHTS FOR DECEMBER

The Session met on Tuesday, December 20, 2016 with Rev. Jeff DeYoe moderating the meeting, twelve elders and two newly elected elders in attendance. Others present: Barb Sheets, Deacon; Gary Brothers, Facilities Manager; and Barbara Heflin, Clerk of Session.

- Approved the 2017 Operating Budget \$655,844 which is approximately \$6200 less than last year's budget.
- Approved the Shafer family's request to establish the Judge Robert T. Shafer Memorial Endowment Fund to assist a
 member of Covenant Presbyterian Church, who is a recent high school graduate, with a one-time \$500 scholarship to
 attend a regionally-accredited college or university.
- Approved the Property Committee's request for \$7,000 to replace the air-conditioning unit in F206 and the restrooms upstairs with the expense coming from the emergency reserve funds.
- Donations received for the Alternative Christmas Gift Market totaled to-date \$5,613.18.
- Sunday, January 15, 2017 has been designated as Deacon Sunday.
- Officers' Training has been changed to Saturday, January 7 at 1:30 pm in F207 and Installation of Officers during the worship service on January 8th.
- The Stewardship Committee continues to receive pledges for 2017.
- The annual financial review prepared by Richard Shafer and Jef Farlow was received.
- Our thanks to Gary Brothers, David Beardsley and Maurie Salvesen for their efforts in repairing the submersible pump which provides water for the irrigation system. The individual assisting with this repair billed the church \$350 for his services and then marked the invoice a donation.
- Reports for the Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 22nd are due no later than Thursday, January 5th.

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A Message From Our Pastor

Greetings,

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Dawn Castner is making me write my New Year's newsletter article while I am still trying to get Christmas Eve all figured out. But I won't get sympathy from her because she has to get the thing printed in the busiest time in the year, while she also has to take care of the details of our early 5 p.m. Christmas Eve family service. That's along with everything else she has to do around here.

All I would like to do is think about the New Year's message I am supposed to write to you, but I'm having a hard time because of all the worship services I have to worry about. You see, *Barbara Heflin* is making me write worship bulletins for two Christmas Eve services, one Christmas Day service, and even the Sunday worship bulletin for New Year's Day! But I can't complain too much about that either because she is up to her ears in putting together all the parts that go into all those different bulletins. Barbara is the person who reminds me of everything I have to do. If she wasn't around nothing would get done, or it wouldn't be done right anyway. At the same time, she is keeping *Nanette Smith* busy with the parts of all the bulletins that she has to get done, and Barbara really has to crack the whip because Nanette is thinking about that Christmas cruise she is going on with her family for which they all leave on Friday. So we need her copy before she blows this joint. *Dean Heflin* is looking pretty peaceful out there in the main office. He wonders where all the coffee cake that was brought in by yesterday morning's receptionist has gone...but I can honestly say I only ate two pieces. Large pieces, yes, but only two. But Dean is waiting for the floodgates to open, because once Barbara puts the last touches on all the bulletins, he'll be chained to the copy machine for days.

Actually, for all the whining I do about being overworked this time of year, I have it fairly easy when it comes to writing up the required bulletins. After all, Warren Apple has turned in all his music; Eric Nanz knows what the youth band will be doing for the services; the scripture lessons were picked many decades ago by the wise old biblical scholars who came up with the lectionary; there are plenty of prayers and responsive readings for the season in all kinds of resources out there, unless I decide to write my own; and we all know what the hymns are—the basic rule of thumb in seminary worship class was that you didn't pick Easter hymns for Christmas, so that's not hard to do if you were paying attention in class. I am very cognizant that for every piece of music Warren and Eric turn in for the bulletins there are hours of practice going on. There are choirs and singers and bell choirs and instrumental pieces and bands that must all be practiced and ready to go for a couple of the big worship services of our year. And I am thankful for their commitment and for the "blended" feel in our common worship. Coming up with blended worship is not an easy task, if you do it wrong it can feel contrived. But I am not a separate-intocontemporary-service/traditional-service kind of person. I want us all together. I want us all sharing our gifts with each other however different they might be. Being different is not incongruity if it is about gathering all the good gifts of God into one voice. Jesus got gold, frankincense and myrrh—very different from each other. Mary and Joseph might have wanted food instead. But they were given gifts representing the differences of the places from whence those wise guests originated. And worship in my mind and heart is always about the gathering of the gifts of many, during the holidays, but throughout the entirety of the church year.

Talking about gifts, and along the line of music, *Maria Bahruth*, has been hoping to sing in worship on Christmas Eve, but it was evident while lighting the Advent wreath on the Fourth Sunday of Advent with her family that she is suffering from a chest cold. The previous week she directed the Chapel Choir in a

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wonderful Advent carol, so she's been burning the candle on both ends too. Even a holiday season doesn't always prevent colds. So she may sing on Christmas Eve (we hope so), or may not, but I am grateful for her contributions all year round.

But I do have a role in all of this. I have to come up with sermons, meditations, messages. That's not hard for me, except it is always a little more challenging when you have to come up with titles for four different sermons, days, even weeks in advance. So...if you heard a sermon around the time of Christmas and New Year's that didn't sound like the title it was given way in advance because the bulletin needed to get printed, now you know why.

While I am doing my work and watching the work of others swirling all around me, *Gary Brothers* is dressed in his manual labor duds because the pump for the irrigation system on the church property is giving us fits and he's having to crawl down in some hole you'd never find me getting into. The week before Christmas and you're down in a hole rooting around trying to figure out why the irrigation isn't right. At least we are doing Christmassy things. He's down in a muddy hole...but the shepherds probably didn't get time to shower before coming to the manger either. In the meantime, *Barbara Thrasher* is running around with all kinds of marching orders about how the sanctuary has to be for one service, and then switched out another way for a different service, and in the meantime making sure everything looks good and presentable and clean for the members and guests who will show up on Saturday and Sunday. Barbara loves this place, it is evident every minute she's here and her care for it is a gift. And... this place loves her.

The fact that Nanette just walked into my office and laid my last paycheck of the year on my desk reminds me that our bookkeeper, Jean Ann Gogerty got all the year-end check writing business for Covenant done in the middle of the Finance Committee meeting in my office to try to finalize next year's budget so she could be off to do her holiday thing with family up north somewhere. And this week, our financial secretary, Mary Callaway, was working hard to get the Monday morning deposit ready so she and Steve can head up to Atlanta to be with the family at Christmas. You may not know this, but Christmas is always a big challenge because all the different giving has to be plugged into all the different slots for which the givers intend it. She comes into my office and asks me about this, that and the other thing and I say: "I dunno." I'm a lot of help. But even though they fly the coop for the holiday season, along with Nanette on that Caribbean cruise (Do I sound jealous? They are even going to attend a Christmas Eve service on the boat!), the commitment of our finance staff all year round is huge. I see it regularly and I am thankful.

Then, with all my comings and goings around here, we have a whole team of *good folks at the church* reception desk making their contributions by fielding calls and meeting the public so everyone else I have mentioned can do what they have to do.

So there you go... In the middle of complaining about all I have to do for Christmas and New Year's celebrations in the church, I wound up mentioning everyone who really does all the work around here. And at the end of 2016 and for the beginning of 2017, I give thanks for every one of them because it's their ministries that make all the difference at Covenant Presbyterian Church.

Thank you to Pack 93 Cub Scouts for supplying and spreading the mulch in the playground and around the trees in the courtyard. The pack has also been doing a good job of helping around the church campus on other occasions with weeds and landscaping.

The next time you see Maurie Salvesen, David Beardsley or Gary Brothers, give them a big "thank you" for repairing our deep well irrigation pump.

The submersible pump, located 120 feet below ground level, had broken loose from its pipe, preventing the system from functioning to irrigate our lawn and plantings. The system is necessary as using city water is cost-prohibitive.

Involved in this repair was the rental of an aerial platform and a qualified well specialist, who billed the church \$350 for his services—then marked the invoice "a donation". This volunteer labor and equipment donation resulted in the total saving to the church for the rehabilitation of the system being nearly \$2000!

Family Ministries is Hosting a Peace Pole Making Event: Sunday, January 22nd, 11:30-1:30 pm and include Pizza Lunch!

Peace Poles have been planted around the world since 1955 with the universal message of: "May Peace Prevail On Earth" in many different languages. On January 22nd, the Covenant community will have the opportunity to make a peace pole which will then be "planted" on site. Those who participate will also have access to all the supplies needed to make their own peace pole, to be

planted in your home. We will begin with an introduction as to the significance of the Peace Pole and conclude our time with a short Peace Pole planting ceremony as we "plant" the pole that has been created together.

PLEASE NOTE: This gathering will require signing up in advance at the Connection Station board in the courtyard or by calling the church office no later than Monday, January 16th so that supplies can be purchased in advance. The cost for this event is \$25 per family or household and covers the cost of ONE peace pole that can be "planted" in your yard, porch or other place in your home AND PIZZA LUNCH. There will be a peace pole display in the church courtyard beginning January 1st. If you would like to plan on making more than one peace pole, there will be an additional \$20 charge.
