#### Greetings,

In Christianity, Judaism and Islam, the number 40 is often symbolic in the telling of stories about faith. In Hebrew Scripture (our Old Testament) the flood in Noah's time lasted 40 days and 40 nights. Moses and the Israelites wandered in the Sinai desert for 40 years. Islam teaches that when Moses was on the top of Sinai, he did not return to the Israelites for 40 days. Often in Jewish history, the great kings of Israel were said to have ruled for 40 years.

We are told that Jesus fasted on the Mount of Temptation for 40 days and 40 nights. The count of days between Christ's resurrection to his ascension is 40 days.

And so this brings us to the Lenten Season. This, of course, is a season that was created by the early church and has no biblical precedent, but in a way it does. Quite often, the number 40 in both our Old Testament and New signify some important spiritual understandings. The first understanding is not so spiritual, and quite obvious: The number 40 was used to basically say "a long time." It took a long time for Noah and his family to wait out the flood. It took a long time for the escaped Hebrew slaves to get out of the wilderness. Jesus was up on that mountain for a long time before he began his ministry. For the disciples it seemed like a long time that the risen Christ was with them before he ascended into heaven.

But the other reason the number 40 is significant is because it represents what we are doing in the midst of the "long times" of our lives. Jesus was not just up on the Mount of Temptation for a long time, he was preparing himself for the public ministry he was yet to conduct. We are told that he was up there to pray and meditate, but also to face "Satan" which represents the temptations of the world over and against the calling of God.

Originally, the early church came up with the Season in Lent as the preparation time for new converts to become members of the community of faith. This was a time when it was not popular to be part of the church in a Roman Empire that was not yet sympathetic towards the followers of Jesus. To choose to become part of this body of Christ was potentially lethal, and at best it would be hard. In line with the 40 day periods given to us in the biblical witness, the church determined that there would be a 40 day preparation time for these converts before officially becoming members on Easter Sunday, which included their baptisms. Infants were not yet automatically baptized into the church; this would happen later when the Roman Empire became the Holy Roman Empire and everyone wanted to be Christian now that Caesar was. The 40 days of Lent were a time of serious study and preparation. New converts would know their Bibles and the beliefs of their church very well before their day of baptism and entry into the church on the day of Christ's resurrection.

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
Lent is different for us now. It is still intended to be a season of preparation, but preparation for what? Most of us were baptized quite young, and many of us have been church members for a long time. So what do we prepare for? Many in the early church literally interpreted a passage in the Gospel in which Jesus said that his followers would not die before they saw him return. And so Lent was often a time to think seriously and prepare for Christ's imminent return. Enough generations have now come and gone for us to know we will most likely live out our natural lives before that happens.

So we ask again: For what do we prepare in the Lenten Season? I believe we are constantly called to prepare for what it means for Jesus, by the power of his Holy Spirit, to come into our lives in an ever-changing world. This world moves much more quickly than it used to when I was a kid, a youth, and a young adult. The Internet and social media gets us in touch immediately. We get answers for things we wonder about more quickly, but I often wonder if it has made us any wiser. We no longer have time to process things that have occurred in our world in order to understand them better. It seems that one thing happens right after the next, and we have no opportunity to give any of it quality thought. Studies show us that our children and youth are not intellectually absorbing and critically thinking as well anymore because the distractions of smart phones are pulling them away from substantive thought process. New generations are simply learning how to react.

Perhaps Lent can be a time for us to think about what this all means. To put away the phone and Internet and consider what it means to be a child of God, a member of the body of Jesus Christ, in a faster paced world that now teaches us that speed is everything. Remember when you wrote a letter, and save a rare long-distance telephone response, you waited a week or two before getting something back in the mail? Now we are impatient if someone does not answer our email within an hour or two. Sometimes we even think it is rude.

There is nothing we can do about how our world has changed and where progress takes us. But we still have the freedom and capability to willfully slow it all down for the sake of listening anew to God and the ways God has communicated with believers throughout many centuries. For the Season in Lent 2017 I will pray that you can slow down so you may better hear what God is saying, and I ask that you pray I can do the same.
