## A Message from our Pastor...

### Greetings,

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OCTOBER

I will be honest and say that as a pastor, bringing up matters of church finance is not my favorite part of the job and is something that throughout my career I have done very sparingly. For the most part, around stewardship season in the life of churches I have served I sought to put this whole matter into a theological/faith framework, and mostly in line with how Jesus reflected upon such earthly realities. I cannot know for sure, but I would guess that in his mind it was not the most important thing on his priority list, but the fact is that he talked about it a lot throughout the gospels. From my reading and understanding of biblical context, he brought it up as often as he did because he saw how it was getting in the way of people doing the work of God's Kingdom.

Church financial challenges have been front and center since the first day I walked into Covenant as your pastor over three and half years ago. We are a congregation of just under 600 members, up from the original 400 or so who committed themselves to a new beginning eight years ago. We are a congregation for which that new beginning meant having to take care of a church facility that once served the needs of twice as many people. We are a congregation that still has a staff structure in which a number of needed key players are volunteer and do not receive a salary. We are a congregation that has known the blessings of having a volunteer base for these past eight years that has made the difference in being able to afford this ministry. Many have contributed to the work of maintaining our large facility so that we have had not to call service people as often as most churches do. And many have contributed programmatically so that often the costs of simply doing ministry we all take for granted have been greatly reduced and even eliminated. To you, who have given of yourselves even beyond your financial giving we are very thankful and in many ways indebted.

We are quickly arriving at a place that church leaders and I have seen coming for awhile. The property committee has actually discussed the fact that most of them can no longer climb up on high ladders to do the difficult work of maintaining the building. When they are unable to do that our costs inevitably go up. They have done well to help us defer, but the things that once could be fixed and held together with a little magic are quickly becoming items where we need professional service to fix, replace and maintain. Recently, someone from the city code enforcement department came onto church property unannounced, inspected the cosmetic, soffit-type structures that can be seen above as you enter the elevator/office area from the parking lot, and determined that they are a hazard because the stucco is breaking up and falling down. There is now yellow caution tape below these structures and the city

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has given us 60 days to correct the code violations. The property committee has been aware of the problem for some time. It is the result of many years of maintenance failure on the church's part, and is one of those matters we had to defer as of late because we had more serious facility problems to address. Now we will have no choice and wonder how we shall proceed with no financial reserves at this point in time.

Last year, the Session voted to cut budget and presented a bottom-line to the congregation that was less than the year before. This year, the finance committee has called upon all committees to cut their proposed 2016 budgets by at least 5%, and preferably as close to 10% as they can. Because the "fat" of the budget has been gone for a long while, we will be cutting into that which we would describe as the heart and soul of church program and mission. At the same time, we anticipate the possibility of not offering salary increases to our paid staff for 2016.

I can tell you that although I don't welcome this, it does not come as a surprise to me. Congregational giving has been pretty much holding steady since I have been here, but the reality is that we were losing ground bit by bit over that time because such giving has not really increased to meet our ongoing need. We actually would have been in this place a year or two earlier if not for the fact that in my first fall season here we ran a Miracle Sunday campaign to make up the budget deficit and wound up with a little extra to commit to reserves. Then, as you might remember, we headed into that New Year and had a major failure of the old sanctuary air conditioning system and had to have another campaign (your worst nightmare is to run a successful financial campaign and shortly thereafter have to run another one), which along with some of the reserves we acquired earlier enabled us to replace that system. There are other AC systems serving other parts of the facility, by the way, that we have been nursing along for quite some time and we keep hoping and praying that they will hang in there a little longer.

There are a lot of people we can thank for their selfless contributions to helping us "stay afloat" around here. There are many "worker bees", who if we did not have them we'd be in financially deeper than we are now. There are also those "angels" who have, above and beyond their regular pledge, heard about projects that absolutely had to be done and contributed even more to the cause. I want to commend Gary Brothers, our facility manager, who looks for every possible way to cut costs, and looks for creative ways to address needs that would be much costlier without that kind of commitment.


My message to you, the CPC congregation, is that we are at a place in which we need, most importantly your prayers, but also your attention and concern. The Session has voted to change its stewardship season back to this fall (as it had been traditionally done) simply because delaying the process of budgeting and planning to meet our church needs until well into the first quarter of our fiscal year has not worked well given the challenges we are facing. You will hear more about this soon, but the key to success is to realize that when all of us give just a little more big needs do get met.

As I said at the outset, this is not the kind of newsletter message I like to write and I really don't like being the bearer of bad news. Yet, given what we know and the challenge before us I would not be fulfilling my responsibility as your pastor if I said nothing. It is my hope that we will all pray about the needs of our church ministry and respond accordingly. This is a great place to worship and pray, study, be in fellowship, and work together in the mission and service of Jesus Christ. I look forward to getting beyond these particular challenges so that we can serve God together as we always have.

While serving my first parish there were a number of times when the parish treasurer approached me on payday and said: "Jeff, we have to wait until after the offering is received on Sunday in order to pay you..." More than once I thought to myself that this rural parish would not survive much longer. Thirty-four years later, those churches still exist and are doing ministry. This is consistent with what God has shown me as a minister: God is faithful to his church. I have seen that truth play out throughout my career and it is one upon which I have always stood.

# COVENANT PRESBYTERIANS AND FRIENDS IN PALESTINE

On October 5th a group from Covenant Presbyterian Church, as well as others from elsewhere in the United States (14 in all) are heading for Israel and Palestine and will return on October 19th. The main reason for going on the trip is to participate in the Palestinian olive harvest taking place in the Occupied Palestinian Territories, otherwise known as the West Bank. The Covenant group is traveling there as the U.S. Presbyterian contingent, known as Keep Hope Alive, that will join a larger international team of anywhere from 50-75 people from Britain, Europe, and Australia. The program is organized by the Joint Advocacy Initiative of the East Jerusalem YMCA and the YWCA of Palestine. Its purpose is to assist Palestinian farmers and their families in harvesting the annual olive crop. It is very often the case that even while the land upon which these olive trees grow has been owned by Palestinian families for generations, the Israeli military prevents the owners from working their own land. The reason is because Israeli law stipulates that farmland in Palestine which has not been worked for two successive years is subject to eminent domain. If the military can prevent any work being done for that period of time, the government automatically takes it in its increasing effort to make Palestinians landless. The tree planting program, in which a group from Covenant participated in February 2014, and the olive picking program which occurs in the fall, is an effort by the global Christian community to prevent this injustice from occurring. In addition to the harvest, travelers will have the opportunity to learn about Palestinian culture, as well as life under a 48 year occupation. In addition to the work we will be doing, the group will also visit holy sites in the Galilee region, as well as visiting Jericho, Bethlehem, Old City Jerusalem, the Dead Sea, Masada, and Qumran, where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered. Oct. 4 Prayer: Intimacy with God


Oct. 11 & 18 Compassion: The Heart of Jesus' Ministry

The Session met on Tuesday, September 15, 2015 with Rev. Jeff DeYoe moderating the meeting and eleven elders in attendance. Others present: Gary Brothers, Facilities Manager, Pat Arner, Deacon; and Barbara Heflin, Clerk of Session.

- Approved changing Commitment Sunday to November 15th with Minute for Missions on October 23, November 1 and 8th.
- Approved the 2016 Wednesday Morning Live lecture series. (Watch for further information in the Clarion and Bulletins)
- Approved the Junior League of Fort Myers use of D1 and D5 on Saturday, October 3, 9:00 a.m. 2:00 p.m. for a fee of \$75.
- Approved the following times for the Christmas Eve services 5:00 p.m. Family Service; 8:00 p.m. Candlelight Service.
- Approved Hunter Ferrell, who is director of World Missions in Louisville, to hold a meeting at Covenant on Wednesday, November 18th at 1:30 p.m. He will be the keynote speaker at the Presbytery meeting on November 19th at the Community Presbyterian Church, Englewood.
