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From the Pastor's Heart:

"Old & New"

In his book, *Praying for a Whole New World*, my good friend Bill Carter, pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Clarks Summit, PA (who, by the way, will bring his Jazz group, PresbyBop, to Covenant for an April 12 concert and lead worship on April 14), tells the story of a priest in a certain Midwestern city who wanted to help inner-city children see something more than their own situations. So he put them on a bus and took them to see some things of great beauty. Children went to the art museum and saw paintings by the masters. They went to a symphony matinee and heard beautiful music. They went for a walk through a neighborhood of homes that were done over by a creative team of architects. That young priest showed those children the best and brightest things he knew.

Then the kids climbed back on the bus and went home. That night, one of those young boys set his apartment house on fire. His neighbors and family members were rescued, but the place burned down. The priest was in tears when he visited the boy in a detention cell. "Why did you do it?" he asked.

"I saw all those beautiful things," said the boy, "and then I came home and saw how ugly my world was, and I hated the ugliness, so I wanted to burn it down."

Carter then writes, "Shine some light in a dark place and there's no telling what will happen. When all you have ever seen is darkness, that is all you know. And when light comes, it makes for a contrast. Darkness remains a choice. In fact, it is possible for light to come into the world, and for somebody to say, "Turn out the lights!" It is possible for the Light of the world to shine on people and for those people to not accept it" [Lima, Ohio: CSS Publishing, 2000].

And sometimes too, even if we really wanted to live into the reality of the new, our old selves often get in the way. One of my favorite Garfield comic strips is this one on how excited Jon is about the new year:

Old and new: As Christian believers, we do live in a new world but it's a new world not yet fully realized — there are still many fears and hang-ups that we have to deal with in the old reality — disappointments, diseases, pains and sorrows, the threat of a failed economy, the winds of war along with acts of terrorism by rogue states, of a disintegrating social existence, with increasing uncivilized public behaviors.

But does it mean then we should despair over them, or just be in denial, or to withdraw from the world altogether? No, we need to face it fully and then to decide that the light has more truth than the darkness.

As we become the children of God, "the Father of glory" (Ephesians 1:17-19) begins to move in on our old world: In this moment of special communication, the light dawns, not just on our ears by the spoken word, but also begins to open our imaginations — The grip of the old rhetoric, and of the fearful ideology that traps us, begins to loosen — the Child has been born, the Light has shown, we are already new children of God and the eyes of our hearts have been enlightened!

As we begin tentatively to live in the new world, let's trust the hope that has been given to us, let it help us begin to live in new ways, especially in this new year, seeing "beyond the tears and pains and sorrows" and see and experience how God is able to help us overcome these old fears.

Let us turn loose our resentful world and live anew — the Epiphany is not necessarily a cognitive event, but it is deeply transformative of our common life. Christmas doesn't just celebrate the babe of Bethlehem, it also celebrates the eternal Word, as close as breathing, and as powerful as the very breath of God.

Chili Cookout, January 21



Worship God

"We are gathered around the same book, the same cup and loaf, the same baptismal waters, all speaking of the mercy of God for the life of the world" (see John 6:51).

"Worship God" is our focus this month. The following is from the discussion:

Worship is adoration of our creator through



silence, words, gestures, and songs in which we express our gratitude to God for all of God's gifts to us. Worship is joy; worship is praise; worship is the acknowledgement that we believe in something-someone-greater than ourselves. Scholar Marva Davis has said, "To worship the Lord is-in the world's eyes-a waste of time. It is, indeed, a royal waste of time, but a waste nonetheless. By engaging in it, we don't accomplish anything useful in our society's terms."

In a culture focused on consuming and getting things done, worship seems silly. There is nothing to be earned or won in worship, except perhaps an enlightening of the soul or a renewed sense of purpose. God does not give out gold stars for perfect worship attendance. At its heart, worship is nor a transaction between us and God, but a strengthening of the relationship we have with God. Worship aligns us rightly with God. Worship reminds us of our place in God's heart.

The worship actions we do together, week after week, shape us to be people following Jesus in the world. Sunday worship is the source for how we make choices about our lives and our behaviors, how we treat neighbor and stranger, how we care for resources of land and sea, how we learn and grow into our baptismal identity as Christ's body in world.

Scattered throughout the Bible are many hints as to what worship looked like n both the Old and New Testaments. Among the many aspects and dimensions of worshipping God, we will look at four in this unit. They are:

Gather – Jan 7 – Luke 24:13-35; Zoom Jan 8 Participate – Jan 14 – Nehemiah 8:1-5, 5-12; Zoom Jan 15 Be Changed – Jan 21 – Luke 9:28-36; Zoom Jan 22 Bless God – Jan 28 – Psalm 104; Zoom Jan 29

What Are Star Words?

We have some new members since last year, so it may need to be explained for those new to the practice.

The use of star words, also called "star gifts" is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year. The idea is that intention words, or guiding words, are printed on paper stars.

Typically, participants are encouraged to trust the word they have drawn. Individuals are also encouraged to place their star word somewhere that they will see it regularly throughout the year to allow consistent reflection on how God has moved through, around, or in connection to that word.

Those who are in worship will receive them there. If you are not in worship and would like to receive a star word, please contact **Barb Sheets** and one will be sent to you.

Whatever you do with this word, whether it guide you daily or you look at it a few times, receive it as a gift!
