### FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART:

#### **Everyday Resurrection**

As we move beyond Easter Sunday, it can be tempting to tuck away the celebration along with the lilies and pastel decorations. Yet Easter is not simply a day — it is a way of life. Christ's resurrection is not a moment we commemorate once a year but a living reality that shapes who we are every day. As Easter people, we are called to live in the light of the empty tomb, bearing witness to the hope and victory that Jesus has secured.

The resurrection of Jesus changes everything. It is the cornerstone of our faith, the assurance that sin and death have been conquered. Because Christ lives, we too have the promise of new life. This promise invites us to see the world differently — not as a place overcome by darkness and despair, but as a place where God's redemptive power is always at work.

Living as Easter people means living with hope, even when the world gives us every reason to despair. It means trusting that God's love is stronger than hatred, that light is stronger than darkness, and that life is stronger than death. In a culture often marked by fear, cynicism, and division, Easter people are called to be joyful witnesses to the Good News.

Hope is not passive. It is not sitting back and waiting for things to get better on their own. Hope is active. Easter people are called to embody the resurrection by the way we love, serve, and forgive. We are called to be agents of reconciliation, builders of peace, and bearers of joy. Every act of kindness, every word of encouragement, every moment of mercy is a testimony to the risen Christ alive in us.

The early Christians lived this way, often at great cost. They gathered in joy, shared their possessions, cared for the poor, and extended hospitality to strangers. They lived with the constant awareness that the resurrection power of Jesus was not confined to the past but was alive and moving through them. Their lives shone with a light that could not be extinguished, even in the face of persecution.

Today, we are invited to continue this practice. Being Easter people means that we carry resurrection hope into our families, our workplaces, and our communities. It means forgiving even when it is hard, believing in new beginnings when situations seem broken beyond repair, and choosing love when it would be easier to walk away.

This Easter season, let us ask ourselves everyday: How is the resurrection shaping the way I live? How am I embodying the hope of Christ










### Luncheon hosted by the Human Resource Committee in April







In 2015, nearly every country in the world (195 in total) committed to the Paris Agreement. The goal of the Paris Agreement is to limit global warming to well below 2 degrees C, and ideally below 1.5 degrees C, compared to pre-industrial levels. The world is not on track to meet these goals. There is a vast gap between the promises governments have made and the actions they have taken.
